# Setting Up for Success: Ideal Habitat, Supplies, and Affiliate Recommendations

Before bringing home a leopard gecko, creating an ideal habitat is essential. Leopard geckos originate from dry grasslands and rocky deserts, so replicating these conditions will help them thrive. Your gecko's setup should include a spacious terrarium (at least 20 gallons for adults), a secure lid, and appropriate substrate. # Habitat Essentials: Your Gecko's Home Checklist



## Tank & Lid

A minimum 20-gallon glass terrarium with a secure mesh lid is ideal. Larger grounds allow more room for your gecko to explore and exercise.



## Hides (Warm, Cool, Moist)

At least three hides provide safety and comfort. Use one on the warm side, one on the cool side, and a moist hide with sphagnum moss for proper shedding support.



## Heat & Humidity Control

An under-tank heater and reliable thermostat maintain correct heat gradients. Invest in a hygrometer to monitor humidity, keeping levels stable and healthy.



# Nutrition and Feeding Issues: Preventing & Solving Common Diet Mistakes

Diet is a major factor in your gecko's long-term health. In the wild, leopard geckos eat a variety of insects; in captivity, their staple diet consists of crickets, mealworms, and dubia roaches. Regularly overfeeding or using fatty worms like superworms can lead to obesity. Feed adult geckos 2-3 times per week and juveniles 4-5 times per week for optimal growth and health.



## Limited Diet

Relying solely on one insect type can cause deficiencies. Rotate feeder insects often and source high-quality, gut-loaded options.



## Missing Supplements

Skipping vitamin and calcium dusting leads to serious illnesses like metabolic bone disease. Always use reliable supplement powder at least twice weekly.





# Shedding Problems: Causes, Signs, and Step-by-Step Solutions

Shedding, or ecdysis, is a normal part of gecko growth and skin renewal—but it can quickly become a problem if humidity is too low or hides are inadequate. Stuck shed, especially on toes and tail tips, can cut off circulation and cause permanent damage if left untreated. Signs of trouble include patches of retained skin, unusual rubbing, or a faint, grayish hue that doesn't resolve after several days.

Step-by-step solution: First, confirm that your moist hide is functioning correctly—fill with damp sphagnum moss or paper towels and refresh daily during shedding. If there's stuck shed, gently soak the gecko in lukewarm water for 10-15 minutes, then use a cotton swab or tweezers to carefully remove residual skin. Avoid force!

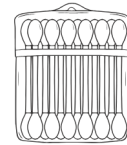
## Moist Hide Maintenance

# Health Concerns: Identifying, Preventing, and Treating Illnesses (With Product Recommendations)

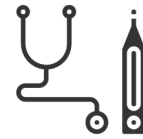
## Metabolic Bone Disease (MBD)

Caused by calcium or vitamin D3 deficiency, MBD leads to weak bones, deformities, and even death. Prevent with proper supplementing and lighting regimen.



## Parasites & Infections

Internal and external parasites can cause digestive issues and weight loss. Always quarantine new animals and use clean, reputable feeder insects.



## Rapid Intervention

If signs of illness appear, act fast! Use digital thermometers and water conditioners, but reach out to a reptile vet for best outcomes.





# Habitat & Environmental Troubles: Lighting, Humidity, Temperature, and Affiliate Fixes

Environmental control is the backbone of gecko health. Even minor deviations in temperature, lighting, or humidity can cause health or behavior problems. Common mistakes include using overhead lamps without a thermostat, neglecting humidity checks, or failing to create a thermal gradient in the tank.

# Environmental Mistakes & Quick Solutions



## Wrong Temperatures

Wrong temperatures cause stress and illness. Use a thermostat to keep the warm side at 88-92°F and cool side at 75-80°F.



## Humidity Blunders

Humidity too high or low leads to shedding issues and dehydration. Check levels daily with a digital hygrometer.



## Improper Hide Placement

Place moist and dry hides strategically on both warm and cool sides to let your gecko self-regulate body temperature.



# Handling Stress & Behavioral Problems: Managing Aggression, Hiding, and Lethargy

Leopard geckos are naturally shy but become trusting companions with regular, gentle interaction. However, stress can manifest as excessive hiding, tail-waving, defensive posturing, biting, or lack of appetite. Overhandling, loud noises, tank-mates, or poor habitat conditions are the usual triggers.

Solutions: Limit handling to a few minutes at a time, especially for new arrivals. Handle over soft surfaces in a calm environment. Avoid housing multiple geckos together unless they are proven females and the tank is large. If lethargic, check habitat conditions immediately for temperature or humidity errors.

## Proper Lay Box

## Egg-Binding Warning Signs

If your gecko appears lethargic, bloated, or strains without laying, immediate veterinary help is vital. Egg-binding is life-threatening!
